**Peace and Restoration**

With peace came the urgent need to rebuild and reconstruct Britain – an enormous task since in London alone 700,000 homes had suffered damage from bombs. But Britain, her resources all but exhausted, was described by the economist JM Keynes as facing a 'financial Dunkirk'. Crippling shortages meant ration books were still to be found in every home; the remaining wartime 'utility' clothing, specially designed to make the most of scarce resources, was to remain in vogue.

Even the coinage did not emerge uncirculated. Silver, for so many centuries an integral element of the currency, seemed an anachronism by the mid-1950s – years of austerity that would follow the War; indeed, to repay the eighty-eight million ounces borrowed under the wartime Lend-Lease arrangements with the United States, there was no choice but to draw on the vast reserves of silver held at the Bank of England's vaults. The old coins were accordingly replaced by copper-nickel, to be grieved by critics as a 'dull, dreary, utility coinage' appropriate for the difficult years of economic recovery.

Posters showed St Paul's Cathedral, which had survived the Blitz, and the dome of the Palace of Westminster, which had been severely damaged during the war. The dome was restored in 1956, and the cathedral was finally re-opened in 1962.

**The End Of The War**

'The greatest outburst of joy in the history of mankind.' With these words, Winston Churchill captured the world's reaction to the happy news that, after almost six long years, the War in Europe was finally over and that all hostilities were to cease after midnight on 8 May 1945. VE Day, jubilant crowds sang and danced in the streets of London, New York, Paris, Moscow and in cities and towns throughout the world. In the Far East, however, the War continued.

There the end came only months later on 15 August, VJ Day, with the unconditional surrender of Japan, and Allied nations the world over were again able to unite in joyful celebration.

**The £2 Coin**

On the reverse of the £2 coin commemorating the 50th anniversary of the end of the War, John Mills has depicted mankind's desire for a peaceful world, featuring in his own words 'a symbol of aspiring peace, the calm, beautiful and optimistic image of a Dove'. Peace is emphasised, too, in the edge inscription 1945 IN PEACE GOODWILL 1995, part of the well-known 'moral' that prefaces Churchill's history of the Second World War:

In war: resolution. In defeat: defiance.  
In victory: magnanimity. In peace: goodwill.
